Sudden Illness Halts Address Attacking Roosevelt

DETROIT, Aug. 17 (AP)—Father Charles E. Coughlin, who offered a partial collapse in Cleveland at the National Union for Social Justice Convention, returned to Detroit at 10:29 a. m. today.

CLEVELAND, Aug. 17 (AP)—The Rev. Charles E. Coughlin, feeling much better after a night of rest, left by train today for his home in Detroit. The priest's address to his National Union for Social Justice was halted yesterday, when he was overcome by illness during a denunciation of the Roosevelt administration.

Resuffers from Exhaustion

A policeman on guard outside a hotel room, Father Coughlin slept comfortably after he was stricken by what Dr. George J. Malley, Cleveland physician, described as exhaustion and a nervous disorder, superinduced by the intense work of planning and carrying out the first convention of his National Union for Social Justice.

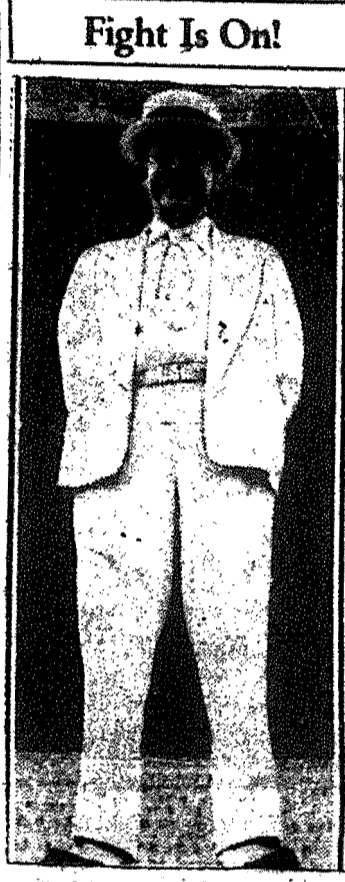
